Walk Across America

This year the Social Justice Committee will focus its programming on issues surrounding health care. Health care is a social justice concern considering that many of the maladies that create poor health are connected to unhealthy living conditions, inadequate diets, stress and environmental toxins, and limited access to health services. Each month through May speakers and programs will be offered to joyfully encourage and challenge all of us to look closely at our lifestyles and support one another in decisions that may improve the health of ourselves, our families, and community.

Our kick-off program will be Sunday, February 4th at 9:00am, with Kathy Miller, a health care specialist, discussing the benefits of walking 10,000 steps a day. We will offer pedometers to all who want to move more and begin a fun challenge to Walk Across America. Every minute walking (or swimming or biking) will equal one mile. We will track people's progress and offer fun incentives along the way. Walk alone, walk with a friend, or walk with your family. The important thing is to start moving!

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From Our Pastor s Desk...

One of the gifts that came our way at Christmas this year was a DVD of Al Gore's documentary, *An Inconvenient Truth*. If you haven't seen it, I highly recommend it! In it, Gore outlines - in graphic detail - the many consequences to all of us if we continue to ignore the environmental issue of global warming. He challenges every one of us to begin to make choices in our own lives that will positively impact this issue over the long run. If we do not, he warns, the earth will lose its ability to sustain a quality of life as we have known it, within just a few generations.

As I watched this film, I was reminded of one of my favorite church sayings - If you always do what you always did, you'll always get what you always got. The time has come, says Gore, to do something different, in hopes of getting a different outcome!

Science and politics aside, our faith has some important things to say about our relationship to the earth. Our understanding that God is the Creator of all life means that all creation is holy. In the same way that human beings are holy reflections of a loving Creator, so too the earth and all that is within it, upon it, or around it are a part of God's holy love for the world. How we treat one another and how we treat the earth are a part of how we treat God.

In the book of Genesis, we are told that human beings are to have dominion over the earth and all that is in it. Over the years, that has been understood to mean that we are in charge, that we have the right and the responsibility to use the earth

and its resources for our own purposes. But in these days, we are coming to understand that - when all is said and done - the earth will have the last say. If we continue to live the way we have been living, the earth will continue to warm, and continue to be depleted. We may disagree about the timeline, but in the end, the earth will be unable to sustain the life that we know is so holy.

Like so many things in our faith journey, this issue requires that we confess that we truly like the way we are living. We like the comfort of large homes that are warm in the winter and cool in the summer, and always light. We like vehicles that are more like a living room than a car. And we don't spend much time considering that our abundance may mean another's scarcity.

This issue requires more than confession, however. It requires that we work together, knowing that we are all affected by this. It challenges us to understand that -like with so many things - the poor are affected more than the rich or the middle class. It also invites us, individually, to begin living differently. There are ways that we can minimize our impact on the environment - and we are all challenged to do them in hopes of changing the outcome.

Too often we think, I don't make a difference. or Why should I make changes when the government and the big companies are really the ones who need to change? Jesus reminds us that each one of us is precious in God's sight, that each one of us has the power and the influence to make a difference. In the end, if it doesn't start with us (and people like us) - how will it ever change?

A Surplus! A Deficit?

Our Annual Meeting was a great success! Nine different kinds of chili helped to warm the cold night, and we joyfully received the good news that we ended 2006 with approximately a \$5600 SURPLUS, after having paid off the carpet! We unanimously approved the 2007 budget, which reflects a projected \$16,000 DEFICIT. If we work together and give a little more than we thought we would, it will turn out like 2006! New Way to Give in 2007

Congress has enacted legislation as part of the Pension Protective Act of 2006 which offers charitable-minded individuals a golden opportunity to make gifts directly from their IRAs. This will exclude the amount of the gift from gross income. To qualify:

- * The donor must be 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ years of age or older
- * The transfer must go directly from the IRA to qualified charities
- * Gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per taxpayer
- * Gifts must be made outright. Transfers to donor advised funds, supporting organizations, charitable remainder trusts, and charitable gift annuities do not qualify

This opportunity is available only if you transfer funds directly from your IRA by December 31, 2007. Any gift you give this way will count toward your Minimum Required Distribution for the year. Since IRA accounts generally contain assets that have not be subject to income tax, there is no charitable income-tax deduction. Outright distributions to charity from any other type of retirement plan (like 401K) do NOT qualify under the new rule. For further information, consult your financial advisor.
