## From Our Pastor s Desk. . . .

---

February is best known for Valentine s Day - one of the few holidays NOT shared by the church! The focus on romantic love during this month provides us, in the church, a wonderful opportunity to reflect a bit on the meaning of love in the Christian tradition.

In his farewell conversations with his disciples, remembered in the Gospel of John, Jesus says I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another. (Jn 13:34-35)

Later Jesus says, again, This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one s life for one s friends. (Jn 15:12-13)

We believe that God IS love. We trust that, no matter what the circumstances of our lives, we walk in the light of God s love for all the world. We are challenged to share God s love with the world - with neighbors and strangers.

There is that wonderful camp song from the 1940's - They Will Know We Are Christians By Our Love - which shaped my understanding of faith. There is the favorite old hymn - Love Divine, All Loves Excelling . I Love to Tell the Story reminds us of our love that is a response to the love

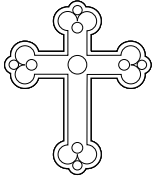
of Jesus. And, of course, there is the classic children s song - Jesus loves me, this I know ....

Love is the cornerstone of our faith - love received and love shared with the world. But, in spite of the fact that the words are the same, we - as Christians - mean something different than the rest of the world.

Jesus was not talking about love as a FEELING - as in Valentine s Day. Jesus was talking about love as an ACTION, love as a WAY OF LIFE, love as a DECISION we make to tend to others as carefully as we tend to ourselves - in spite of the fact that they may be very different from us.

I don t think Jesus ever thought we would like our neighbors (at least not all of them and not all the time!). In spite of that, he commands us to love them. Jesus asks us to make their children as important as our own. Jesus asks us to remember that our lives are no more important than our neighbor s across the street or on the other side of the world. Jesus knew that this is not easy. He knew that we would not do such a difficult thing perfectly. But love is so important that Jesus asks us to try to do it anyway. And in the midst of our efforts, he promises to be with us - even to the end of the age. Don t miss the journey or the companions!

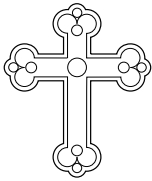

## Annual Meeting Recap

---

This year's Annual Meeting was a celebration of a great year. Outgoing Moderator, Tim Mandell, provided leadership and vision as we reviewed some of the successes of 2005:

- " Twenty-seven new members
- " Monthly Habitat Work Days
- " Foods Resources Bank Project
- " Increase in Food Pantry Giving
- " Beginning the year with a \$22,000 projected deficit and ending the year breaking even
- " Youth Mission Project
- " Caregiver Coordinator position reinstated
- " CareNet Program begun
- " A new Confirmation/Youth Fellowship Program
- " Wednesday night programming for children and parents

2005 was, indeed, a wonderful year!

As a congregation, we adopted the budget for 2006 which was proposed by the Church Council, which contains some real challenges for us all. It projects a \$14,000 deficit, if giving does not increase to meet the needs. Spending has increased in a variety of places, mostly in mission and utilities. The budget also includes a 3% increase in salaries for our staff. Again, this year, it will take all of us working together to make this budget work. We did it in 2005, let's do it again in 2006!

## Stewardship Reflections

---

There is both GREAT news and a real challenge in front of us this year. The GREAT news is that in 2005, in addition to what we expected to receive in giving, we made up a \$22,000 projected deficit AND received \$14,600 extra to almost pay off the roof loan! The remaining \$400 debt was retired at the Annual Meeting, as gourmet pies and desserts (all made by our Outgoing Moderator, Tim Mandell) were auctioned!

The challenge before us is another projected deficit (this year only about \$14,000). We will make that up this year in the same way we did last year - as each of us reach deeply into our hearts, souls, and checkbooks to give more generously than we thought we were going to give. This could happen in a variety of creative and fun ways:

- " Match the amount that you spend each month on fast food, and donate it to Edwards.
- " Match the amount that you spend each month on coffee, and give it to Edwards.
- " Consider giving the church a Birthday Present when Pentecost rolls around this spring.
- " Count the number of beds in your house, and give \$20 for each one.
- " Increase your pledge.

This will turn into the same success that 2005 did, if we all work together!
